I am particularly keen to promote involvement in quality of life studies that are inclusive of the patient journey and daily struggles when living with long-term conditions. This extends to raising the profile in cancers of unmet need in particular oesophageal and pancreatic cancers, having experienced loss of close friends and family to these cancers.

I have worked in the private sector in procurement and manufacturing roles, in the voluntary mental health sector in project management. I have a Master's degree from Ulster University in the Development and Co-production of Social Care Research and sit on core health and social care research groups in Northern Ireland as a service user partner. I currently work in partnership with the Health and Social Care Research lead, Queens University and Ulster University along with community and voluntary sector partners; in co-producing and cottoning research courses for service user and carers.

I currently work in an advisory capacity with many organisations who rely on health data and recognise its significance in research to improve outcomes for all patients. This includes lay representation on Clinical Practice Research Datalink, Can Gene Can Var patient reference panel, the Clinical Research Committee at Cancer Research UK, National Cancer Research Institute's Consumer Forum.

Living in Strabane a rural town in N. Ireland, I am also a member of Northern Ireland Cancer Research Consumer Forum, Public Involvement Enhancing Research and work closely with local researchers on clinical studies at national level. These experiences have helped me understand the very diverse UK research landscape and I enjoy learning from and working with all contributors".

"I am from Bath, England & first got involved in voluntary work (advocacy work in mental health forensic medium secure hospital) while recovering from heart surgery after my third heart attack.

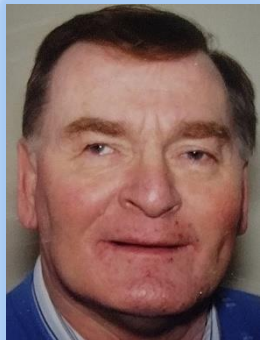

Other involvement opportunities included NIHR South East & South West Research Design Service (RDS) on the Project Management Committee reviewing research applications prior to submission for peer review.

I have been involved in different research studies that covered area of personal interest to include Mental Health, NHS management & Leadership, Treatment Resistance Depression and Cardiovascular disease research studies which support my personal journey from surviving an Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest in 2019 & being discharged six weeks later with both an ICD and diagnosis of severe heart failure, using online peer support both here & America has been of great benefits to self-managing my symptoms, also being involved with James Lind Alliance Priority Setting Partnership for Heart Surgery, Advanced Heart Failure & Community Nursing has aided my knowledge to better support & managed my conditions & would recommend Patients, service users, Public & Carers to get involved.

Bekki Reid-Millar



Having trained as an adult nurse I was always aware that any treatment went through extensive research and testing before it was approved for use. When the opportunity arose almost a decade ago to join Diabetes UK London in research, I jumped at the chance and became the only person from Northern Ireland at inception to join this brand new venture of clinical studies research groups which are made up of lay members, HCP's, and researchers. I remain active with them today and the opportunities since have continued to present themselves.

I am a massive advocate for advances in technology to help people in their daily life to manage their health and also research into creating a world where diabetes can do no harm. I am also a massive advocate for research across the board to support all people living with a health condition or who need treatment of any kind. As previously mentioned, I volunteer for Diabetes UK London and have done since 2017. I became a member of the Diabetes Research Steering Group for Type 1: Targets, Preventions, and Therapies. The aim of this group is to help improve the lives of people with or at risk of diabetes through research. The groups bring together researchers, healthcare professionals, and people living with or associated with diabetes to pinpoint where exactly research needs to happen to have the greatest possible impact on individuals lives. I have worn both a lay PPI hat and currently an HCP hat within this role. This group is one of 7 that, alongside DUK, are leading the fight against the UK's biggest growing health crisis and silent killer. From this group, I became involved in the DUK mental health panel, ADDRESS-2 through Imperial College London, and I am on the database of NIHR as a lay reviewer of research proposals. I have co-authored 2 research papers both of which are published in Diabetic Medicine: one is entitled "Transforming mental well-being for people with diabetes: research recommendations from Diabetes UK's 2019 Diabetes and Mental Well-Being Workshop" and the other "Impact of glycaemic technologies on quality of life and related outcomes in adults with type 1 diabetes: A narrative review" I undertook the DUK Discovering Leadership course which was an amazing course for giving me tools for developing and leading change within both my professional world and my personal with the aim of sparking changes that will benefit everyone living with any form of diabetes and I will be undertaking the UK's first CBT and Diabetes Course starting January 2026 at Kings College London.

I also volunteer for Kings College London on a brand new project that is the first of its kind in the UK and I am, again, the only person from NI involved. This project is designing the first ever Diabetes Distress tool to be implemented into clinical practice along with a mandatory CPD training course for all healthcare professionals working with any type of diabetes. I believe the work that the work I do with multiple places in the field of Diabetes is my working indirectly for patients to advocate, strive for change for the better, and increase the awareness of Diabetes expelling myths and historical inaccuracies associated with living with diabetes to push for a world free from judgement or discrimination within this area. I am in the process of starting a consultancy business for people living with diabetes along with their carers, friends, and family with the aim of providing solid expertise advice based on my own knowledge and training and also peer support groups which are vital. Diabetes is my passion and my lifelong dream is to specialise and progress to a research doctorate however I have a desire to see research influence significant and long-lasting positive changes within the NHS to improve care and access to it for everyone.

"Health and wellbeing have been a deep focus of mine since the death of my father, who passed away far too young due to a mix of stress, lack of mental wellbeing support, and poor medical advice. I have also witnessed how women in my community often live for years with conditions that could be prevented if science-backed information were available and accessible, as women's health is still too often treated as an afterthought in research. These experiences have shaped both my professional and personal motivation: to use my expertise in communication to improve access to information, enhance patient experience, and contribute to population health. I am committed to supporting research that helps people — myself included — age with independence, joy, and without unnecessary reliance on care."
