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




# No. of Women invited and screened by BreastCheck from 2008 to 2016






#### Overall Eligible Uptake Rate from 2008 to 2016

#### Eligible Uptake Rate for Initial, Subsequent and Previous Non-Attenders from 2008 to 2016





Total number of women diagnosed with breast cancer


#### BreastCheck age-range extension

- From 2000-2015 eligible age-range 50-64
- From 2016 eligible age-range 50-69
- Phased implementation
- > 2016 50% 65 year olds
- ➤ 2017 50% 65 year olds + 50% 66 year olds
- > 2018 50% 66 year olds + 50% 67 year olds
- > 2019 50% 67 year olds + 50% 68 years olds
- 2020 50% 68 year olds + 50% 69 year olds




## Impact of breast cancer screening

# More screen detected breast cancers



## "Apparent" increase in incidence




#### TUMOUR STAGE


## NCRI Breast Cancer Report 2012



- Cases who presented through screening had significantly better survival than those who presented symptomatically.
- Censoring date 21/12/2009
- Adjusted for age, stage, grade, smoking, deprivation & residence

Presentation	Cases	Survival %	Hazard ratio^	95%Cl
Symptomatic	23,826	73%	1.00	
Screening	3,454	95%	0.46	[0.39, 0.53]
Unknown	2,208	82%	0.78	[0.70, 0.87]

## Methodology and Findings



- Compared outcomes between East of country (Region 1) where screening was introduced in 2000 with west and south of country (Region 2) where screening was introduced in 2008.
- Breast cancer mortality in Region 1 was 9% lower than in Region 2.
- Expect full benefit to be higher over time
- 7% reduction in advanced breast cancers (stage II-IV) in Region 1 compared to Region 2
